

Reilig na Eaglaise Modhaí Preisbitéirí

The United Methodist and Presbyterian Church in Queen St. formerly known as Victoria Place is listed a building of regional significance in the National Inventory of Architectural Heritage (Reg. No. 30314060). The corner-sited Methodist church and school share the same façade and were built c. 1835. The buildings are classical in style with round headed window openinings topped by a triangular pediment. The porch with its pointed arch headed door is probably a later addition. The graveyard is contained within a walled vard to the rear and southern side of the church, and the memorials all date to the 19th century. They are, for the most part, set against two of the boundary walls, and primarily take the form of simple headstones with carved lettering. The centre of this small graveyard is dominated by the early 19th century tomb of William Nassau Alley, which is capped by a carved fluted pillar that lends it impressive height.

01 James Henry - 1853

Two of the 11 headstones in this small graveyard are dedicated to church ministers. One to the Rev. James Henry, a Wesleyan Minister who died in 1853 (01) and the other to Rev. William Cornwall died in 1860 (08), aged 63 and 74 respectively.

05 Dorothy Ranson - 1899

Four of the 11 headstones (05, 06, 07 & 09) in this graveyard are dedicated to children (aged between 3 weeks to 13 years), Dorothy Ranson, Robert Gildea, Rachel Dillon and Eliza Jane Bradley. The simple headstones range in date from 1844-1899.
